Every year has been newsworthy in the life of Project VOYCE, this year especially! Nine years ago, I was a first-generation college student at the University of Denver. I was a Daniels Fund Scholar and Manual High School Alumna engaging in heated debates about the equity in one of Denver's first high school shutdowns. As a student who had been part of a reform experiment myself, I committed my studies and extracurricular involvement to supporting other

students like myself. A passion project evolved into the Youth School Reform Institute and later into Project VOYCE (Voices of Youth Changing Education). We are approaching our tenth anniversary and we have truly changed the game in obvious ways. Ten years ago "youth voice" was not a commonly understood concept amongst educators or those in the field of youth development. Ten years ago, youth membership on boards was a far fetched idea that perplexed most people. Ten years ago we weren't discussing "authentic" youth engagement, and ten years ago nobody would've thought to hire a young person to train an adult in a substantial content area. Today, Project VOYCE is proud to say that we laid the foundation in Denver and Colorado for youth to be strategic partners and consultants to individuals across sectors at every level of government and organizational hierarchies. STUDENT TESTIMONY

"I Went to 4 different schools in 2 years, my father was absent most of my life, I would see him around here and there and when I did it's like he never seemed to notice me. I am 1 of 12 children. I only see 4 of my siblings.

I use to argue a lot with my mom and had to move out at the age of 12. I have been raised around gangs all my life. When I moved out, I myself was gang banging and selling drugs. Because I didn't have much to provide for myself, drug dealing became my only option. It was wrong, but I know now how to take care of myself.

Last summer my older brother was shot in his stomach. This summer, he was stabbed 2 times and came close to dying because of his gang affiliation. I knew then I didn't want to follow that path.

It was harder to stay away from gang affiliation, selling drugs, and violence when i was on my own. For 6 months, I wasn't attending school, and when i did, I was 2 grade levels behind in my education. Last year, I realized that I needed to better myself and my life. I moved back with my mom and found Denver Justice High School, where I had the good fortune of getting introduced to Project VOYCE.


Nobody has impacted my life as much as my counselor, trainer, and mentor-a youth trainer at Project VOYCE. I may not even be here if not for her support.

Shelby and PV have provided the support and skills I needed to transform my life in the most positive way possible. Although I have had many challenges in my life I am learning how to deal with them from people who have been through the same things and made it through successfully. We trust each other at PV and we respect each other's experiences. We are experts at PV, we are valuable.





Individuals Served by Type




Participants Recieving Free & Reduced Lunch




Support & Opportunities Provided to SLI Participants






Type of Individuals Served per Activity Type




Participant Race & Ethnicity






PV Engagement by Type
